

### **An Article from an Online Database (or Other Electronic Subscription Service)**

Cite articles from online databases (e.g. Student Resource Center, LexisNexis, JSTOR,) and other subscription services just as you would print sources. These articles often come from magazines and newspapers, so be sure to consult the How to 'Cite a Magazine (print)' or How to 'Cite a Poem' page. Why Poem page? It tells you how to cite a poem or a chapter from a book.

In addition to this information, provide the title of the database **italicized**, and the date of access.

**Note:** Previous editions of the MLA Style Manual required information about the subscribing institution (name and location). MLA no longer requires this information.

Note: Don't forget to 'reverse indent' the 2<sup>nd</sup> line of the citation. To do this, hold down the Control key and press the tab key. Do you agree that this line and the next line are reverse indented?
